A NOTE TO OUR SUPPORTERS FROM CEO, COLLEEN ROBINSON



Dear Habitat Supporters,

In October of this year, I had the great honor of joining several national Habitat colleagues at the Carter Work Project build in North Carolina. Together, we constructed 27 new homes. As you would expect, it was a lot of work. At the same time, it was also one of the most rewarding experiences of my life. Working side-by-side with determined Habitat families – to help change the trajectory of their lives – was both inspirational and reaffirming.

While in North Carolina, I thought about how the financial barriers to owning a home have grown from when I originally set foot in the Habitat Clallam offices. In those 6+ years, housing affordability in Washington State has only become more of a challenge. Back in 2018, families purchasing a median-priced home could expect to devote approximately 25% of their income to their mortgage. Fast-forward to 2023 and it is now almost 40%.

At Habitat Clallam, we believe everyone deserves a decent place to live, regardless of whether it's through a new build, a critical repair, or to help age-in-place. This guiding belief is the reason we have set some ambitious goals for 2024. We are going to build what we believe. I invite you to join my staff, along with many others in the community and me, to help fulfill that promise, so all local families might have a safe and healthy place to call home.


Why?

CRITICAL REPAIR PROGRAM

For Carole & Joy this project was about more than just a pretty deck. It was about regaining much-needed access.

In late March 2023, Carole Halsey and her daughter Joy Wisely contacted Habitat Clallam to see if our Repair Program could help with some deck repairs at their house. Both Carole and Joy use electric wheelchairs to mitigate significant mobility issues. Carole also spends several hours each day in a medical bed.

They had become increasingly concerned about the soundness of their front deck. Due to the size of their electric chairs, it was the only feasible entry and exit point. A number of the boards had been slowly rotting, making it more and more difficult for them and visiting healthcare providers to access the deck. In fact, Joy was so worried the decking would collapse under the weight of the wheelchair that she learned the pattern of where the soft wood was and navigated around it.

After reaching out to a handful of organizations, Carole and Joy were referred to Habitat Clallam and our Critical Repair Program. Very early into his initial visit, our Construction Manager Joe could see this project went beyond replacing a few soft boards. His further inspection validated what he suspected – there was a lot more hidden damage to the deck. He quickly replaced the most heavily damaged boards and then developed a plan to rebuild the entire deck as soon as possible. Along with a handful of talented, long-time volunteers, he tore off the old deck, built a strong new frame, replaced the decking and railing, and even added a few small areas to hold potted plants.

One week later Joy was out in her wheelchair, traversing all corners of the new, very sturdy deck. She credits Joe and his crew for having given the family not only a beautiful deck to enjoy, but also true piece of mind, knowing that the next time the paramedics have to come help Carole they will have easy and safe access as well.
